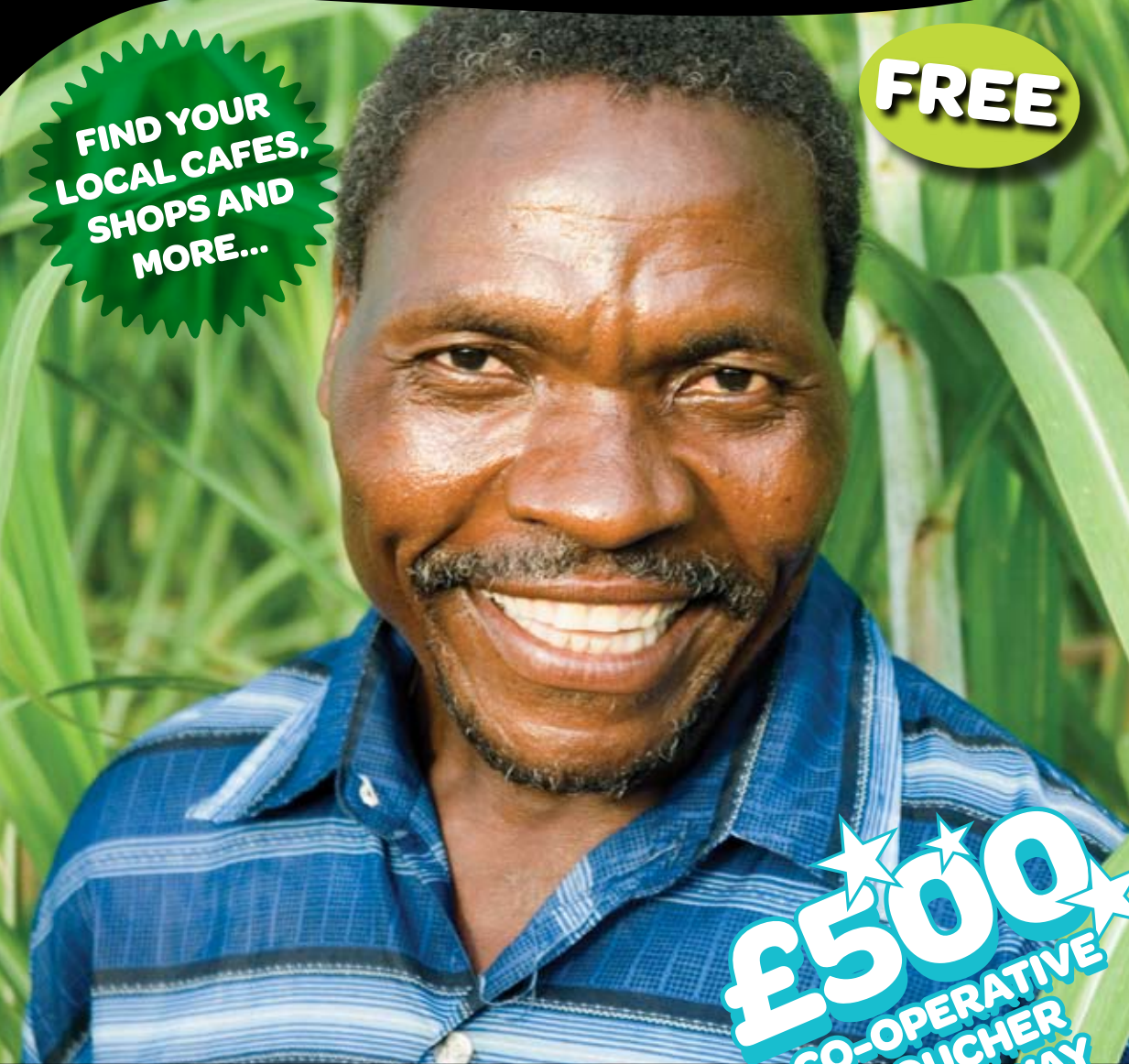

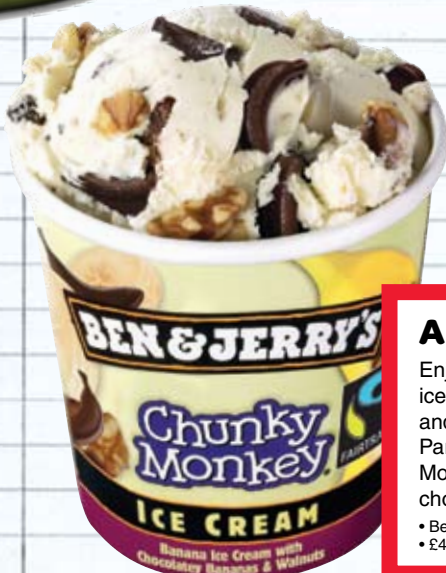

Fashion and Fairtrade

During Fairtrade Fortnight 2008, Devizes Fairtrade Group organised the town's first Fairtrade Fair in the Corn Exchange in the Market Place. Well over 100 people came to browse the stalls, which sold a wide range of Fairtrade products. The stallholders came from Wroughton and Newbury, as well as the Fairtrade town of Devizes, and those who needed refreshment could enjoy Fairtrade drinks and biscuits.

Many of the models for the two fashion shows were from Devizes School and they wore clothes from Bishopston Trading in Bradford-

on-Avon and the mail order firm People Tree. The India Shop in Marlborough also showed off their latest collection of clothes.

The garments produced by these companies are made from Fairtrade cotton, mostly organic, and the FAIRTRADE Mark guarantees that the people who make them work under healthy conditions, with no child labour. People who bought clothes and other items at the Fair not only got some beautiful handmade products but also helped producers have a better life with sustainable development.

Wiltshire Fairtrade Coalition

Fairtrade towns first caught the imagination in 2000 when Garstang in Lancashire declared itself to be the first in the world. Since then, more than 400 others have joined the movement.

Devizes in Kennet has achieved Fairtrade Town status and it has now banded together with eight others in the county to form a Fairtrade coalition. Three further towns are also in the process of applying to become Fairtrade towns.

The Wiltshire Fairtrade Coalition meets on a quarterly basis at the offices of Wiltshire Wildlife Trust in Devizes. By sharing ideas and experiences, members can make a more co-ordinated impact.

The coalition is working towards achieving Fairtrade County status for Wiltshire, as well as collaborating with Swindon Fairtrade Coalition to widen the reach of the two groups. For more information, contact Sara Cundy: sarac@wiltshirewildlife.org.

Black Gold

Devizes Group held a screening of *Black Gold* in Fairtrade Fortnight 2008. This film contrasts the lives of Ethiopian coffee farmers with the coffee trade in the USA and Britain. The leader of a farmers' union in Ethiopia tries desperately to get a fair price by selling directly to wholesalers. Meanwhile, the coffee exchange in New York gambles on future prices, protected by large reserves (or so it seemed before the credit crunch), and the consumers in Starbucks buy their tall skinny lattes for amounts of money beyond the imaginations of the farmers.

The Africans are seen storming out of a WTO meeting, while the EU representative pontificates about the need to protect trade. (No one from the four multinationals which control most of the coffee trade was prepared to appear in the film.) Meanwhile, the Ethiopians are desperate for new schools to help their children escape from a life of poverty, so many rip out their coffee bushes to grow chat, a mild narcotic which brings in a better income.

The film highlights vividly the contrast in living standards, and the complete powerlessness of the poor in the face of the greed of rich countries. It would be nice to think that in the current economic climate this may start to change, and you can make a difference now by choosing to buy Fairtrade.



Beginners' Guide to Fairtrade

Find out all you need to know about Fairtrade, and how you can help to change the world...

Why do we need Fairtrade?

“The small farmers and workers who grow our coffee, tea, cocoa, cotton and bananas often don't get the money they deserve for their crop.

They can suffer because of this and it can lock them into a cycle of poverty. And when world commodity prices fall, as they have done over the last 30 years, it's these growers who feel the pinch first. Their income can drop to levels that don't even cover production costs, making it hard to provide for their families and maintain their farms. This is where Fairtrade comes in.”

Okay, so what can I do about it?

“As consumers, we have the power to change things, and the power to make a difference to growers and workers in the southern hemisphere.

When you buy a product bearing the FAIRTRADE Mark, you can be sure that the farmers have received a fair price for their produce. Farmers in the Fairtrade scheme get a price that covers the cost of sustainable

production, no matter how low the market goes. Fairtrade also requires long-term relationships with buyers, helping growers to plan for the future. In short, trade can be fair.”

Fairtrade Premium – what's that?

“Producer organisations receive an additional Fairtrade Premium of, for example, ten cents per pound of coffee.

The farmers themselves decide how this extra money is spent. It can be used to build everything from schools and health centres to social facilities, or to enable growers to improve productivity or reduce their reliance on a single commodity.”

How are standards maintained?

“Trade terms, contracts and working conditions are checked regularly, as is the use of funds from the Fairtrade Premium.

This work is carried out by Fairtrade Labelling Organizations International (FLO), which is the body responsible for setting Fairtrade standards and certifying producer organisations.”

So what Fairtrade products can I buy?

“Over 3,000 products carry the FAIRTRADE Mark in the UK.

“The Fairtrade market in the UK reached an estimated retail value of £493 million in 2007.

This has directly benefited over seven million people – farmers, workers and their families – in 58 developing countries.”

Tell us about yourself...

“I buy Fairtrade products from Traidcraft and then sell them once a month at St James Church in Devizes between the two Sunday morning services, and also at fairs and fêtes.”

Why Fairtrade?

“After many years of teaching in Africa, I was looking to do something that was linked with my experience, and so I led the successful campaign for Devizes to become a Fairtrade Town. I want people to buy Fairtrade whenever they can so more farmers can get a better deal.”

What Fairtrade products do you sell?

“Food, cards and crafts. As the supermarkets now stock more Fairtrade products, I don't have to sell items such as instant coffee and teabags any more.”

The Co-operative business model was created by a small group of people who made a stand against exploitation and unfairness. They worked together in a democratic way to begin to supply ethically sourced, fairly traded, high-quality goods to those who become members of their unique enterprise. It's what makes us different and it's why we're so passionate about Fairtrade.

The Co-operative has been trading ethically and fairly for over 160 years, and we've been supporting Fairtrade since the inception of the FAIRTRADE Mark back in 1994. In 1998, we launched our own plan to 'mainstream' Fairtrade. Through ongoing campaigning, innovation and leadership, we've helped

develop the UK as one of the largest Fairtrade markets in the world, supporting millions of growers and producers in developing countries.

In 1992, The Co-operative became the first major retailer to sell Cafédirect coffee, which went on to

become one of the UK's very first Fairtrade brands. Ten years later, we became the first supermarket to switch to 100 per cent Fairtrade across our whole range of own-brand coffee. When Fairtrade sugar first became certified, it was packed under our own brand. Today, every grain of Co-operative Fairtrade sugar comes from The Kasinthula Cane Growers Association (KCGA) in Malawi.

In 2000, we were the first in the UK to sell Fairtrade bananas, followed by grapes, mangoes and oranges.
